In most of the complaints filed, the preperty owners registered no complaint relative to their own property assessments. They claimed, however, that, if their property was assessed at a certain valuation, then other property, generally that adjoining their own, should be assessed more. The assessment books were available during the day and were under almost constant inspection.
