

Utica College Grants 5 Scholarships to Students in Area

Priest Greets Countrymen

Two American priests, touring Latin America were greeted in San Jose, Costa Rica, recently by the Very Rev. Benavente Imhoff, a native of Utica, who for the last 11 years has been in charge of Costa Rican missions of the Franciscan Order.

The Rev. Edgar Holden, OFM Conv., director of the Franciscan Mission Association at Rensselaer, and the Rev. John G. Hart, Albany, were met at Costa Rica's El Coco International Airport by a delegation of American Conventual Franciscans, led by the Utica priest.

Father Benavente has been novice master of missions in Costa Rica since 1946. He was ordained in Albany in 1931. He studied at the Catholic University in Washington, D. C. and served as master of novices of the Order of Minor Conventuals at Syracuse, and as master of clerics at St. Anthony's-on-Hudson, near Albany.

In April 1947 Father Imhoff was isolated for 60 days at a mission at Sabana, Costa Rica, "Franciscan headquarters" during a revolution there.

He has a sister, Mrs. Henry W. Bell, who resides on the Seneca Turnpike, New Hartford. A brother, William C. Imhoff, lives in Watertown.

Mr. Wenigmann was a member of the College Board of Trustees from 1945 until 1952.

U.S. Oil Tanker Is Blacklisted

DAMASCUS, Syria, June 12 (AP)—The Arab League's central office today blacklisted the 10,172-ton U.S. tanker Memory, which flies the Liberian flag. A spokesman told Arab news the vessel had defied Arab boycott regulations by "carrying strategic cargoes" to Israel.

A Danish tanker, the Tivon, U.S. Dannebrog, also was blacklisted on the ground it had operated a year under charter by the Zion Israel Navigation Co.
