MISS ROMANOW IS DELEGATE

Utican to Attend YW Meet in Mexico

Miss Bertha E. Romanow, 913 Sprigate St., will participate in the World Council YWCA Visitors' Program at Cuernavaca, Mexico this fall, it was announced today by Mrs. C. O. Benson, Utica Y board president.

A native Utican, Miss Romanow is one of only 36 representatives from the U.S. selected by the World Board, Geneva, Switzerland, to attend the council sessions September 23-October 8. The council meets once every four years. This will be the first time in its 65-year history that it has met in Latin America.

The YWCA Council is invested with the legislative power of the world-wide association. It is the supreme governing body responsible for determining policies and programs and for transacting its legal and financial affairs.

Ambassador Reports Travel In Brazil Quite Frightening

Brazilian buses, whose drivers often neglect to make certain stops when in a hurry, continue to perplex Katherine Abraham, Utica's goodwill ambassador to the South American country. In her second letter, written July 16 from Santos, Miss Abraham writes of being stranded in a broken-down bus on the edge of a sheer cliff while the driver apparently abandoned his passengers.

"The road to Sao Paulo winds through the mountains and is quite frightening to the uninitiated," she writes. "We came to a hill which seemed unending and where does the bus decide to conk out but right at the edge of the cliff, with nothing between us and the rocks but air. When I looked out the window I couldn't even see the road; just the rocky bottom of the cliff. You could feel the tension increasing because we seemed to be about to topple over."

"My Brazilian sister took it all as a matter of course until the driver appeared to desert the bus. She grew nervous too. At first, we thought he cared only about himself and had abandoned us. Then we saw him again. He was making repairs. The motor started just long enough for us to reach safety and change buses."

Miss Abraham said that her thin spiked-heel shoes have brought favorable comments from Brazilian women. The pointed toe—Italian fashion—is in vogue there, she writes. The only difficulty she has encountered is in walking in spikes on the cobblestone sidewalks which predominate in Santos.

The Utica girl, accustomed to drinking strong coffee in her Lebanese-American home, here, has found that the Brazilian brand is stronger, thicker and heavier than any she has ever drunk before. To dilute the extreme bitterness she adds double the sugar.
