A STORY FROM OUT OF THE WEST.

UTICANS MUCH INTERESTED

John C. Manion of Utica and Max Miller of Herkimer Reported to Have Had Narrow Escape in the Perilous Death Valley Seeking Mines.

A despatch from Greenwater, Cal., under date of April 24 has a story which is of particular interest in the Utica of this paper because of the well known prominence of two of the persons named. It follows: Through the dating of one of the papers of a group of mining claims in the floor of Death Valley, a few miles from this camp, a party of prominent New York and Nevada mining men came very near suffering a horrible death in the lower foothills of Funeral Range, the most dismal spot on the American continent. All would have perished had it not been for the timely arrival of D. W. Sawyer and A. M. Cox of Willow Creek, who had expected the party, and when it did not come, started to look for the missing.

In the party were J. C. Manion, former American Consul to a South African state; J. T. Mitchell of Goldfield; Max Miller, a son of former Governor of New York; W. F. Mitchell, a well known New York engineer; Col. O. P. Pacey of Salt Lake, and Manager John Sevier of the Daisy Mine at Goldfield. The party was on the way to the mines in the valley and had as guide a part owner in the claim who had never been over the road before, but who had been given general directions by his partner.

Under his guidance the party lost its way and the pack animals fell from the rocky trail to destruction below, carrying with them all the water and other supplies. By traveling only a mile the party dropped into the bed of the valley, a descent from Greenwater of almost 5,000 feet. Here the men wandered for two days and nights without food or water, through rocky defiles and over hills and mounds. When Cox and Sawyer found the men their tongues were so swollen that they could not close their mouths. Death would have ended their sufferings within a few hours.

Mr. Manion resides on Chancellor square in this city. Relatives, who have been in daily communication with him by wire and mail since last week, are inclined to make light of the story and to discuss it with a smile.

In a letter received a day or two ago Mr. Manion wrote his party while they were in the valley, that they were stranded over night in the desert, because of a breakdown, he told what a jolly time they had during the period they were thus tied up. There has been no word since.

It is interesting to note that the conditions which would indicate that his experiences have been at all unpleasant or disagreeable.

White living in Herkimer some years ago, and went to John Manion, a South African, to sell mining machinery and while there he became American Consul for that city. The Boer war caused him to return to this State.

LEFT WITHOUT PAYING FEES

Mrs. Stella and Her Theatrical Company Left Tuesday Night Without Paying Cost of Recent Action.

The Italian who was appointed yesterday a stipulation to justice Roberts, which was signed by the plaintiff and defendant and purported to be a notice of discontinuance of the case, it is said that the company and its friends before they left on a midnight train Tuesday. It is said that the settlement according to the agreement as drawn up by the attorney for the defense, without consulting Mrs. Stella, the justice and stenographer remain yet to be paid, while Madame Stella and her company are far away.
