GLENDALE, Calif. (AP) — Screenwriter George Gipe, who collaborated on such Steve Martin film comedies as "Dead Men Don't Wear Plaid" and "The Man with Two Brains," died shortly after being stung by a bee, police said. He was 53.

The death, believed caused by an allergic reaction to the sting, was being investigated by the Los Angeles County Coroner's Office and the Glendale Police Department.

Bomb blast rips Netherlands firm

GOUDA, Netherlands — A homemade bomb exploded at an office of the Netherlands' largest construction firm today in an apparent protest against the deployment of NATO cruise missiles on Dutch soil, police said.

The bomb went off at the main entrance of a building housing a branch office of the Hollandse Beton Groep, according to police spokeswoman Nina de Ruijter. No one was injured in the blast at five minutes after midnight, but the explosion started a fire, she said.

W. German spy agency bombed; one hurt

COLOGNE, West Germany — A bomb heavily damaged the headquarters of West Germany's counterespionage agency today, and officials said they suspected the Red Army Faction was responsible.

The bomb, placed in a car outside the Constitutional Protection Office, exploded at 3:45 a.m. with "incredible force," said Alexander Prechtel of the federal prosecutor's office in Karlsruhe.

The blast slightly injured a passer-by and caused several hundred thousand dollars in damage, Prechtel said.

The bomb, hidden in a red Volkswagen Golf, was detonated by a 90-foot-long cable that stretched around the corner from the building in a residential area of Cologne, Prechtel said.

Tutu leads tours through shantytowns

CROSSROADS, South Africa — Desmond Tutu, the newly installed leader of the Anglican church in southern Africa, today led the archbishop of Canterbury and other dignitaries through the mud and shacks of one of South Africa's worst shantytowns.

"I've been horrified to walk through the dirt and squalor and smell and filth," Robert Runcie, spiritual leader of the 74 million Anglicans worldwide, told reporters after visiting squatter families in their Crossroads shacks of cardboard and corrugated metal.

Tutu, installed yesterday as Anglican archbishop of Cape Town, told Runcie of the factional fighting at Crossroads earlier this year that killed scores of people and left about 70,000 black squatters burned out of their homes.

The root cause of all the problems we have had here is apartheid," Tutu told Runcie as they looked out over one of the bulldozed fields where thousands of people had lived.

Soviets say U.S. held secret test

MOSCOW — Soviet press reports today quoted an American peace group as saying the United States conducted an unannounced nuclear test last Thursday, and called this further evidence that Washington opposes a test ban.

The Communist Party daily Pravda quoted the head of a group called American Peace Test as saying the group had evidence the United States conducted a test dubbed Galvestone the morning of Sept. 4 at the Nevada testing range.

Pravda said its reporter talked by telephone with the organization's national coordinator, a woman in Las Vegas, Nev.

Pravda said it was the 19th nuclear test the United States has conducted since the Kremlin first announced its unilateral moratorium on nuclear test explosions in August 1985.
