Dr. and Mrs. E. Ralph Lewis have been called to Norfolk, Va., by the death of the latter's mother, Mrs. E. R. Hall.

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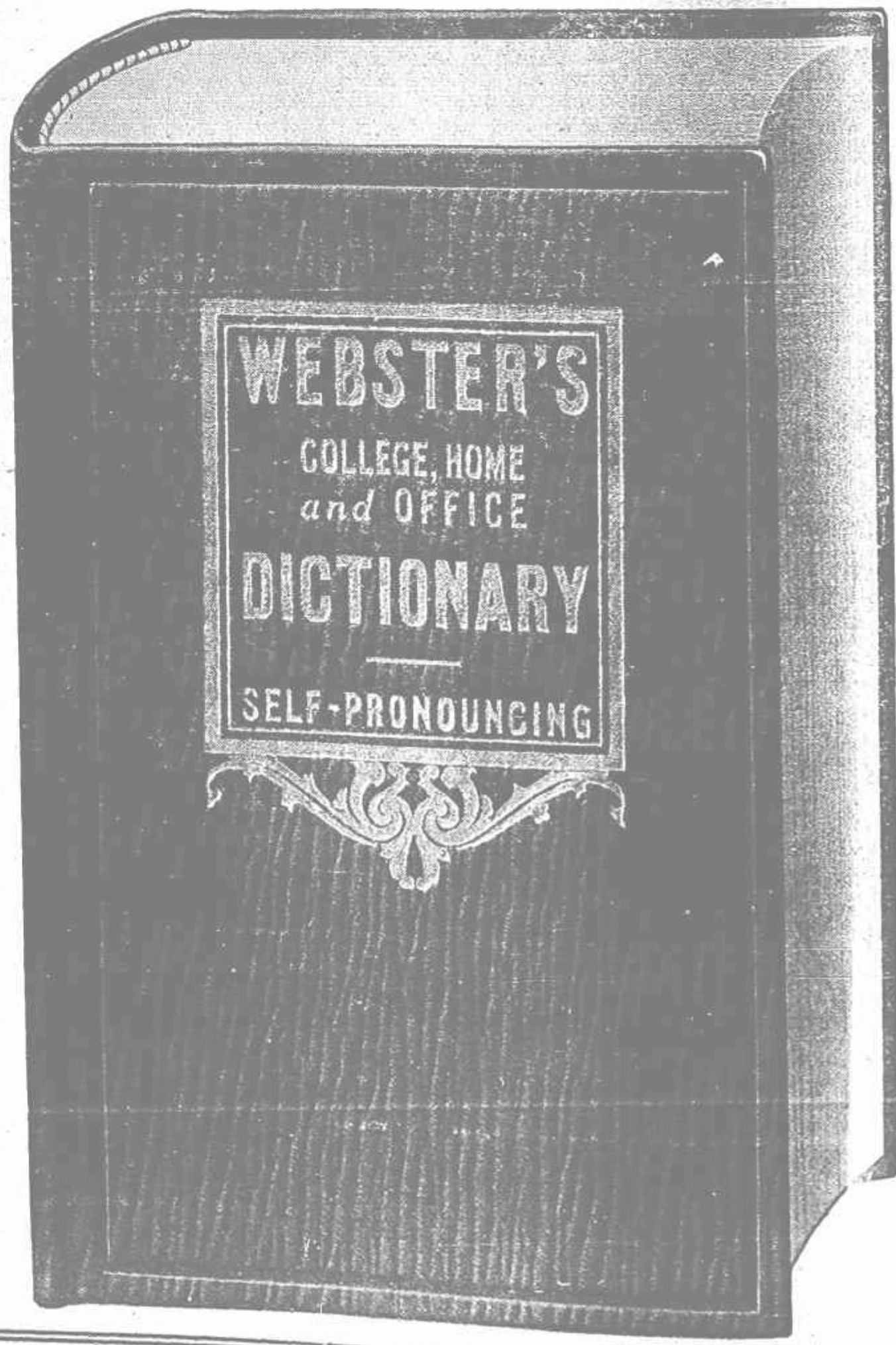
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
