Father Sloan Former Utica Pastor Is Dead

The Rev. Patrick J. Sloan, first pastor of Sacred Heart Parish, died Sept. 15, 1933, in Mobile, Ala., where he had been living in retirement with his mother.

Announcement that word of his death had been received at Sacred Heart Rectory was made by the Rev. George A. Snapey, pastor who also announced that a requiem Mass in his memory will take place at 8 tomorrow in Sacred Heart Church.

Father Sloan celebrated the first parish Mass in the Highland Theater June 22, 1896, and a Mass a Club and Women's Club were organized there. The theater continued to be the scene of the services until the church was built at New and Ann. He remained as pastor until November, 1929.

Father Sloan was appointed June 1, 1926 by the late Most Rev. Daniel J. Curley bishop of Syracuse. He took charge of the new Sacred Heart parish. He came to Utica from Jamestown, where he had served as the first resident pastor.

Father Sloan was born in Baltimore. He attended St. Michael's College, Toronto, and St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester. He was ordained Jan. 15, 1903 and was assistant at St. Vincent de Paul's Church, Syracuse, from 1903 to Jan. 15, 1912. He went to St. Michael's Church, Onondaga Hill, before going to Alabama.

He was a member of St. Mary's Church, its Holy Name Society, Clifton Orange and the Dairy-men's League.

Besides his wife he leaves two daughters, Mrs. Edward F. Driscoll, Clifton, and Mrs. Burton Patrick, Westmoreland, two sons, James Chaswick, and Daniel H. Jr., Clifton; a sister, Miss Margaret Pryor, Clifton; 10 grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

The funeral will be held at 8:45 tomorrow from his home and 9:30 from St. Mary's Church. Burial will be in St. Mary's Cemetery.
