Dynamic T. R. Guided U.S. to First Rank Among World Nations

WASHINGTON — Several million words will be written about the 100th anniversary of Theodore Roosevelt's birth. I should like to write a few words about him from point of view of my father-in-law, Col. Dan T. Moore, who was TR's cousin and military aide.

To my father-in-law and other members of the family who knew TR, he was one of the most dynamic and vigorous men ever to occupy the White House. He was vigorous in his exercise and vigorous in his decisions. Going was not in vogue in the U.S. men but if it had been Teddy Roosevelt would have scorned it. Boxing was his form of exercise. He had fixed up the top floor of the White House into a sort of gymnasium, and there used to box with Col. Moore. They traded some pretty tough blows — so tough that it weakened a nerve in Roosevelt's eye and later he lost his sight in one eye.

NOTHING DETERRED TR Roosevelt used to enjoy walking, and when he walked he carried a cane. Almost nothing deterred him. Only when he came to a tree, would he yield the right of way. For a thicket, a swamp or impassable underbrush, never.

Roosevelt Island, lying in the Potomac between the Key and Memorial Bridges, is named for the late President because he used to enjoy exploring it. But the story is not generally known how TR challenged Col. Moore to swim to the island in mid-March when the river was still icy. Peeling down to their underwear, they reached the island, about 100 yards distant, but were so cold they put part of them on and tried to sneak back to the White House unseen.

Most people don't remember it, but it was Teddy Roosevelt who founded the FBI, virtually founded civil service, revised the army's system of the U.S. Army, and painted the U.S. Navy white. Like his cousin, Franklin D. Roosevelt, TR served as Assistant Secretary of the Navy, and as a great Navy booster he asked Congress for authority to send the newly painted "white fleet" around the world.

Oneida Sets New Parking Site Opening

ONEIDA — A new off-street parking area to aid downtown shoppers will be opened this week.

The police department will start installing parking meters on the Chamber of Commerce property at 108 Main St. this morning, it was announced by Chief George A. Murphy.

The Chief stated he thought about 25 meters can be installed on the lot, and each will be for one to three hour parking. The new parking area will include two strips of property leased from the New York Central Railroad.

Chief Murphy said the Department of Public Works will patch holes in the parking area and clear brush from the railroad property. The lot will be paved in the spring. In addition to the meters, rails set in concrete will be installed at the northern end of the lot, facing the main line tracks to prevent any cars from rolling onto the tracks, Chief Murphy stated.

The police planned to install the meters Saturday, but were prevented by rain.

The White House was alive with children in those days — the Roosevelt children. It was not the silent, dignified edifice it is today. Once Col. Moore caught the Roosevelt boys taking a pony to the top floor of the White House in the elevator.

The Roosevelt children went to the public schools of Washington. They were taught to live and play and they were asked how he got along with "common" boys, he replied: "My father says there are only tall boys and short boys, and bad boys and good boys, and that's all the kind of boys there are."

That was the White House in those days, and that was the man who guided the USA through the energetic, dynamic period when the nation was definitely on the upgrade toward its glorious position of USA 1st-class power.
