

**WILLIAM C. PRYOR**

The death of William C. Pryor, aged 70, occurred at his home on Sunset Drive early Sunday morning after an illness of several months. Mr. Pryor had been ill at his home for some time and prior to that he was confined for several months in a Rome hospital where he underwent treatment in the hope of relieving his condition.

The deceased was born in Kirkland, July 27, 1859, and spent his entire life in this community. He was a son of the late James and Margaret Pryor and was married to Catherine McBride of Clinton a number of years ago. Mrs. Pryor's death occurred eight years ago. For over 25 years the couple lived on a farm near the village of Lairdsville and eight years ago came to this village to make their home. The deceased was a member of St. Mary's Church and of the Holy Name Society.

Mr. Pryor is survived by a son, John E. Pryor, of Clinton and Mrs. Eric Volmer of Rome. He also leaves two brothers, Daniel H. Pryor, Kirkland Hill; Thomas J. Pryor, Clinton, and two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Pryor, Kirkland Hill, and Mrs. Martin Carraher, Utica. There are also nine grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

The funeral was held at his late home at 9:30 o'clock on Tuesday morning and at St. Mary's Church at 10 o'clock where a requiem high mass was celebrated. The bearers were James Jordan, Felix Stern, Richard Moore, George Welch, Joseph Brennan and Lathrop Brockway. Interment was made in St. Mary's Cemetery.
