Bethlehem (AP)—Wilt Chamberlain tossed in 58 points last night as the Philadelphia Warriors snapped Detroit's four-game winning streak, 127-117, in a National Basketball Assn. game.

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Would Kill N.Y. Boxing

Albany (AP)—A former state commission member is now a state assemblyman. Now legislation is being introduced to abolish boxing in New York State.

Francis J. Souhan (D-Seneca) declared that boxing had "come under the control of racketeers."

Souhan was a member of the state athletic commission, which controls boxing, for nearly three years. In a statement he said that many youths who enter the ring suffer permanent brain damage.

He termed boxing "the only sport in which two men face each other and the winner is the one who knocks the other senseless or comes as close to killing him as possible."

Boxing in New York has been under investigation from several quarters in recent years. The state athletic commission has indicated the sport.

Souhan resigned from the commission Jan. 1, 1959, to take a job in the insurance business.

He said last night, however, that he would have left the commission regardless of whether he had been elected.

He explained he was "enthusiastic" when he first became a member of the commission, but he is now becoming more and more aware of the evils of boxing.

Souhan said he is making his statement on his references to racketeers in boxing.

Cus Denied Petition

New York (AP)—Supreme Court Justice Arthur Steiner denied yesterday a petition filed by Cus D'Amato, manager of former heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson, to set aside the action of the state athletic commission in revoking his license.

In substance, the justice said the commission had the right to investigate and that D'Amato had failed to show sufficient reason for altering the commission's decision.

The commission revoked D'Amato's license Nov. 23, 1959, for irregularities in connection with Patterson's fight.

On June 26, Patterson fought a 12-round fight at Yankee Stadium in which Ingemar Johansson of Sweden won the heavyweight title from Patterson.

In the position, D'Amato contended the commission action prevented him from earning a living in the fight field.

Justice Steiner said that made no difference.

Track Chairman Voices Doubt

Ingo Cops Hickok Award As Pro Athlete of Year

Rochester (AP)—Sweden's Ingemar Johansson added another imposing trophy to his fast-growing collection last night.

The undefeated heavyweight boxing champion was named winner of the "Professional Athlete of the Year" poll by a first foreign athlete ever chosen for the honor.

Johansson was presented with the \$10,000 diamond-studded, gold-plated belt that goes to winner at the annual charity dinner of the Rochester Press and Radio.

The handsome, 27-year-old Swede previously had been named "Male Athlete of the Year" in The Associated Press poll, "Boxer of the Year" by the Boxing Writers Assn. and Ring Magazine, and "Sportsman of the Year" by Sports Illustrated.

Johansson, third round knockout of Floyd Patterson, his heavyweight title fight last June 26, won by a substantial margin over Quarterback Johnny Unitas, star of the champion Baltimore Colts, and Larry Sherry.

Says Fight 'Solid Seven' Makes Deal Backs Claim

Rochester (AP)—Gene Fullmer, National Boxing Assn. midweight champion, said yesterday he thought he had been offered a \$1 million deal to fight Paul Pender, but he backed up his claim to 100 per cent of the title.

Fullmer said the fight on television, "I don't think either of them would have lasted 10 rounds with me. I was just sorry I couldn't get it done."

Fullmer said he was going to sit around waiting for Pender and Robinson to agree on the site of any fight.

"I've got to fight," said Fullmer. "I'm not going to wait for them."

State Moves to Dissolve TelePrompTer Enterprise

New York (AP)—The State movie-TV-radi rights of the New York moved yesterday to dissolve TelePrompTer, Inc., a joint venture of the New York State and the TelePrompTer Corp., described as a multi-million-dollar corporation active in numerous fields besides broadcasting.

It began with visual telecasting, a method of conveying information by means of a television set. It became active in the field of radio and television for business conferences.

Irving B. Kahn, president of TelePrompTer, said he was "shocked" at the move.

Elmira Post To Phillips

Elmira (AP)—Jack Phillips, a former utility infielder with three major league baseball clubs, will manage Elmira in the Class D NY-Penn League this season, it was announced yesterday.

Phillips, 36, has been in organized ball since 1943 when he broke in with Norfolk of the Piedmont League. This will be his first managerial assignment.

USTA Ban Bill Passed

Albany (AP)—The Assembly approved unanimously last night a bill that would deprive the United States Tennis Assn. of its right to appoint a manager of harness-track officials.

The measure was sent to the Senate.

Another Yank Dissatisfied With Contract

Rochester (AP)—Pitcher Bob Turley said yesterday that he had a contract calling for a 24 per cent increase in salary, and he is rejecting it.

"I got a contract one degree from all the way," the right-hander said, referring to the 25 per cent maximum cut allowed in the major league contract in 1959-55.

"I can't understand it. They might as well have gone all the way," Turley said.

Los Angeles (AP)—Duke Snider signed his 1960 contract with the Dodgers yesterday for \$37,000—a \$3,000 cut.

Because of recurring knee trouble, Snider played in only 129 games last year, some of them in the minors.

Snider, 33, has hit .287 in 1959 with 49 runs batted in, was second with 23 homers and set a team record by leading the Dodgers in homers with 10.
