# Blood Given in N.H. Visit Used in Syracuse Operation

Twenty-four pints of O-positive blood for an open-heart operation today in Syracuse were drawn yesterday during the 11th annual New Hartford blood-mobile visit.

Royce D. Armstrong, of the Utica Chapter of the Red Cross, said the New Hartford blood was used in the Syracuse operation because the bloodmobile was scheduled to be in New Hartford within 24 hours of the operation. Blood for a heart operation must be drawn within 24 hours of the operation, he said.

The total donation of 130 pints, five over the day's quota, was drawn at two locations, Sitruce Inc., and New Hartford Presbyterian Church. This brought the

11-year contribution of the sponsoring Lions Club and cooperating industries to 1,363 pints.

OF THE 138 persons who volunteered, there were 16 who received one-gallon pins, 20 first-time donors, and 8 rejections for medical reasons. Participating industries included Partlow Corp., Mohawk Container, Munson Mill Machinery Co., GLF, Divine Bros., American Emblem Co., and Thomas Plastikraft.
