



WORKERS ARE URGED TO REJECT CONTRACT

New York State Railways Officials Admit Seriousness of Situation and Prepare to Man Cars in Utica, Rochester and Syracuse by Others if Employes Quit Posts

Rochester, May 21 (P)-A strike of trolley men in Utica. Rochester and Syracuse loomed tonight when the men were urged at special meetings here today to reject the arbitration proceedings and contract offered them by James F. Hamilton, president of the New York State Railways.

The trolley men of the three cities will vote jointly on the two propositions Tuesday, and the ballots will be brought to this city to be tabulated. A negative vote on both propositions means a walkout, union leaders declared.


